



Toolkit - Landscape retention

The Cubikko Auditorium and Exhibition Center is the masterpiece for art and culture, job creation, and community engagement. Its strategic location within the project enables easy access, as a natural extension of the central Cubikko plaza. Whether it is The Biennale Wynwood, a Cuban music concert, or an annual ULI conference, the 100,000 square foot Cubikko Auditorium and Exhibition Center can adapt to the requirements of myriad local and international events.

Cubikko Central Plaza is intended to bring Wynwood culture to life and allow those near and far, young and old, to gather and enjoy the best local experiences of art, food, and open-air events.

The Cubikko Center at the heart of the development, creates a vibrant mixed-use and mixed-income community, relieving some of the gentrification pressures in Wynwood. The building establishes a neighborhood connection between Wynwood and Edgewater, providing housing, working, and mobility choices. The retail at the base is curated to attract pedestrian traffic while maintaining efficiency and mobility.

Cubikko Station is the result of a close collaboration with city officials and public transport organizations. It provides not only ease of connectivity but also entertainment and lifestyle offerings. Incorporating a long-term vision, the infrastructure of the station will accommodate future increases in traffic and transit and will facilitate the expansion of the line and connections between the Metrorail and Tri-rail services according to the City Tri-Rail expansion plan and Transportation Improvement Program of Miami.

The retention landscape includes pocket parks with flood-tolerant plantings. The landscape will be able to absorb as well as hold water during rainstorms and create a wetland-like landscape. During dry days it can accommodate various recreation activities. Such green spaces are primarily located next to NE 1st Ave.
