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Vancouver Global Gateway: Overview

YVR 2013 activity

- YVR Trans-border 4,304,641; Asia Pacific 2,586,013; Europe 1,204,328; Total 17,971,883
- More flights to China than any place in North America
- Second only to LAX in flights to Asia from the Americas
- Port Metro Vancouver (PMV) 2013 activity
 - 2013 China trade 6.4 M mt for 5 biggest inbound commodities, or half of PMV total
 - 2013 China trade was 25.7 M mt outbound for 5 biggest commodities, or 35% of PMV total
 - 2013 Asia trade was over 85% of total for 5 biggest outbound commodities
 - 2013 US trade was 4.7 M mt outbound for 5 biggest commodities
 - PMV creates 57,000 direct/indirect jobs in region; 200,000 jobs and \$9.7 billion GDP in Canada
- Metro Population Diversity
 - 2011 Census had 40.0% of Metro population of 2.3 M were born outside Canada
 - Of this 60% came from Asia highlighting the centrality of Asia Pacific to the region





Vancouver Diverse Gateway Functions

Six key gateway functions

- Transportation gateway
 - Fostered by creating VIAA in 1995 and PMV in 2008
 - Given huge boost by federal-provincial gateway cooperation
 - YVR 2nd busiest in Canada; PMV biggest port, 20% of int'l goods movement, 4th largest on continent
- Tourism and travel gateway
- Immigration gateway
- Educational gateway (100,000+ international students)
- Government gateway (consulates, int'l business associations, etc.)
- Business, trade, finance and investment gateway
 - Federal-Provincial Asia-Pacific Gateway and Corridor Initiative begun in 2005
 - Recognized centrality gateway in national and provincial economies
 - Businesses supporting gateway have great growth prospect
 - IT and sophisticated logistics
 - Professional and business services needed enhance all gateway functions





Realizing Opportunities of This Gateway

City of Vancouver

- Build a clear urban economic vision
- Craft-implement integrated land use-transportation plans to build vision

Metro Vancouver

- Give Metro Vancouver and TransLink true regional power/governance
- Build and implement a regional economic strategy

British Columbia

- Build clear vision and policy for global economy
- Improve labour-management climate and job training
- Address low business investment and productivity growth
- Resolve Aboriginal land treaties and uncertainty

Canada

- Really address poor productivity
- Expand awareness of Asia Pacific in Canada's future across the country
- Sign real open skies treaties and expand YVR landing rights

Global challenges

- Slowing Chinese economy and political issues in East Asia
- Resource boom to bust





Conclusions and Take-aways

- Metro Vancouver is doing very well as multi-dimensional global gateway
- Joint federal-provincial gateway efforts are bearing fruit and exemplary
- Challenges still exist to grow gateway and its myriad opportunities
 - Biggest need: municipal, regional, provincial and national visions
 - Better recognition nationally of role and needs of our gateway for Canada
 - Specific need expand open skies and YVRs global reach
- Conclusion: a very good news story, with more robust future, if exploited energetically
